Last week, the Perikatan Nasional government unveiled the RM250bil Prihatin Rakyat Economic Stimulus Package to address the economic fallout from Covid-19, which pundits have speculated could trigger a global recession.

Enforced on March 18, the MCO is expected to end on April 14.
